Course Description

Organizational Behavior (OB) is an interdisciplinary field drawing from numerous disciplines including psychology, sociology, anthropology, economics, organization theory, statistics, and many others. It focuses on how people behave in organizations and how their behavior and a variety of organizational characteristics impact organizational performance and effectiveness. Key topics covered in this course include: diversity, attitudes and job satisfaction, personality and values, perception and individual decision making, , motivation, group behavior and work teams, power and politics, communication, leadership, organization structure and culture, conflict and negotiation.

Prerequisite: BUS11 Introduction to Business and Management

There will be an additional case book distributed to students at the first day of class, containing the comprehensive cases that we are going to discuss throughout the semester.



Course Hours

The course has 25 class sessions in total. Each class session is 110 minutes in length, for a total of 2750 minutes of in-class time. The course meets from Monday to Friday. ECNU awards 3 credits for this course. Different universities may count course credits differently. Consult officials at your own home institution.

Attendance

Summer school is very intense and to be successful, students need to attend <u>every class</u>. Occasionally, due to illness or other unavoidable circumstance, a student may need to miss a class. ECNU policy requires a medical certificate to be excused. Any absence may impact on the student's grade. Moreover, ECNU policy is that a student who has more than 3 absences will fail the course. Arriving late or leaving early will count as a partial absence.

Grading Policy

ECNU awards grades of A, A-, B+, B, B-, C+, C, D, and F. Most colleges and universities do not award transfer credit for grades of D or F.

Attendance and participation

As the summer school is extremely intensive, students are expected to attend **ALL** classes. Active participation in in-class discussions will cultivate students' soft skills as future managers/entrepreneurs. Note that merely attending each lecture with NO participation will NOT get you full mark for this component!

<u>Essays</u>



There are 3 required essays during the semester. Each essay should be about the cases or chapters covered since last essay due (e.g, Essay 1 could cover any of Cases 1 to 3, or Chapters 1 to 5).

Requirements: 500 words max, Times New Roman, font 14, double-spaced, 1inch margin, stapled (if printed) or converted to PDF (if electronic). Submission: in-class at specified due dates

<u>Exams</u>

There will be 1 midterm and 1 final exam, scheduled in Week 3 and Week 5, respectively. The exams are non-cumulative and contain multiple choice questions, short answers, and written responses. The exams are OPENBOOK, but you must print all your notes. No electronic notes or textbooks are allowed. There is no make-up exam for this course.

Group Presentation

Group presentation is an essential part of business studies. In this course, students are expected to form groups in 4-5, choose a real-life organization, apply knowledge and techniques learned in this course to study the current situations of the business. Detail about the group presentation task will be shared in the first week of class.

General Expectations

Students are expected to:

- Attend all classes and be responsible for all material covered in class and otherwise assigned. Any unexcused absence may impact a student's grade.
- Arrive to class on-time: Late arrivals are disruptive to your fellow students and to the conduct of the class.
- Complete the day's required reading and assignments before class
- Review the previous day's notes before class; make notes about questions you have about the previous class or the day's reading
- Refrain from texting, phoning or engaging in computer activities unrelated to class during class (不要用手机) It is highly disrespectful to the professor and to the class.
- Participate in class discussions and complete required written work on time.
